

What to Bring:

- 12 gauge or 10 gauge shotgun 3 inch, or 3-1/2 inch (each group should bring an extra gun)
- Waterproof camouflage
- Camouflage face mask
- White coveralls, or two piece white suit and face mask
- Big cooler for transport ting birds home
- Warm gloves and leather gloves for setting decoys
- Alcoholic beverages
- Camera
- Headlight
- Blind bag
- Soft gun case for transportation during the hunt
- Please feel free to email or call ahead of your hunt to double check if anything else is needed
- *Be prepared for all types of weather*

We want you to have the best trip possible, and a little preseason warm up is the best way to do that.

A couple rounds of sporting clays in the month or so prior to your trip will not only get you back into shooting form, but it will also let you know if your gun is having any issues that need to be addressed. There are few things worse than a broken gun to ruin a hunt, and where we are there are no gunsmiths.

You will want to use the gun(s) that you are bringing up here and also you should try and use ammunition similar in speed to what you will be using up here. This will ensure you maximize your practise time for your Canadian hunt.

Dogs

We welcome all furry hunting partners that you would like to bring up on your hunt. Here are a few new guidelines that will be in effect for 2013.

- There will be absolutely no dogs in the lodge. No everyone is a dog lover and the hair gets to be a little too much
- There will be warm spot for you to put your dog's crate/kennel when we are not hunting. You are also welcome to keep them in your vehicle if you drive
- In Lucky Lake Hunting Adventures vehicles your dog must be kennelled
- You will be responsible for picking up after your dog, or taking it out of the yard and away from the buildings to do its business
- All dogs in the field must be in a dog blind and staked down, no exceptions. You will be responsible for bringing your dog's own blind and stake. You will want to make sure your dog is accustomed to the blind too prior to the hunt.
- Only one dog will be allowed in the field at a time, as there is no need for multiple dogs. For groups with more than one dog, we will simply rotate dogs through the hunts.

If at anytime the guide feels the dog is being detrimental to the hunt you will be informed and if it persists, you will be asked to take the dog to the vehicle.

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
